It gives me immense pleasure to be with the recovering people and their supporters in the 5th Asian Recovery Symposium in Jakarta. Since 1973, the Colombo Plan Drug Advisory Programme is the first and the oldest regional programme to address the drug abuse problem in the Asia-Pacific region. From its inception, the CPDAP has been contributing to the development of human resources in member countries by enhancing the capabilities of officials in drug related government and non-governmental organizations in drug demand reduction as well as law enforcement.

Asian Recovery Symposium is a celebration of a victory: a victory over drug addiction or alcoholism. It is a celebration of joy, happiness and freedom. We are happy to join the real heroes in this celebration who literally fought the battle against their powerful addiction and emerged winners.

Today as you gather during this 5th Asian Recovery Symposium to seek solutions, you no longer seek problems. I believe that the Symposium will provide an important platform for people in the region to share their success stories and an opportunity to learn the facts about addiction, treatment and recovery.
